From the results of this survey, students will learn about potential career options that could be well suited to their personality. Remember it won't tell you what you 'should become' but it can get you started on your investigations.

<u>Go – Graduate Jobs Directory</u>

While the intended audience of this directory is university students, it has lots of useful information for students in Years 11 and 12 who are exploring their future options. This information includes:

- Grad Stats these show the destination of degree graduates (under 25 years of age), based on their field of study, four months after they completed their course
- Career advice and self-assessment activities
- Profiles of graduates who are now employed
- Job search skills including resumes, interviews, networking
- Industry snapshots covers different industries, providing information about the jobs within the industry, earnings, future employment opportunities, etc.

Is there a test that tells me my ideal job!

That would make career decision making easier, wouldn't it? Unfortunately, it's not that simple. However, there are many tests that can help identify your career interests, work values, skills, aptitudes, personality, etc. at any one point in your life when you do the tests. While there isn't just one ideal job for you, assessment tools can increase your self-awareness and usually, provide you with a list of possible jobs based on how you responded to the test questions. This information can be used to begin your career exploration to find a job that matches up with what you now know about yourself. The following tests/questionnaires are examples of assessment tools that can be used to come up with job ideas. Alternatively, you could visit your school Guidance Counsellor/Officer and ask them about tests or questionnaires they recommend to help you begin your career exploration.

- <u>Job Outlook</u> Career quiz.
- <u>Career Quest</u> This is on a New Zealand career website.
- <u>Jung Typology Test</u> This is a personality test.

School Leavers Employment Supports (SLES)

<u>School Leavers Employment Supports (SLES)</u> is an early intervention approach for Year 12 school leavers. It's designed to support the transition from school to employment. Communication skills essential in the workforce - what do they look like?

Everyone in the workforce needs to understand and develop excellent communication skills. Communication is the key ingredient in a positive workplace, positive individual workplace experiences, positive workplace relationships and overall personal and workplace success. Incorporating the following elements into your conversations and interactions with others will assist you in developing great communication skills.

1. Think first ... open your mouth second - have a clear idea about what you are wanting to say

Begin with a a clear statement of your idea or purpose for the conversation or interaction.

2. Illustration (Give examples)

Provide the listener with stories or models of what this concept idea looks like in real life. This enables them to process the information in a way that accelerates understanding.

3. Conversation - Talk about it

Have the conversation in an environment that the listener feels comfortable in and not distracted. This helps in their ability to process the information or idea you are presenting it

4. Summarise

Summarise your ideas restating the idea or issue, pros and cons, preferred option or outcome and actions needed to be taken

5. Patience and tone

Be patience with peoples understanding and processing of your point or issue. And when talking to them make sure the tone in your voice is not challenging or defensive ... as they say 'it's not what you say but the way you say it"!

The Hidden Job Market

The hidden jobs market is a term used to describe jobs that aren't posted online or advertised. It is estimated to be from 50 - 80 % of the entire jobs market (depending on what you read!). To access the hidden jobs market, you need to network. Networking is not just about meeting lots of people. Effective

networking means being focused by first deciding what sort of work you want. Then you need to identify employers who offer that sort of work. A helpful website that lists large employers in Australia is <u>Job Adviser</u>. Your social network (family, friends, friends' parents, neighbours, etc.) can also help you identify employers.

It is important to put dollars at the bottom of your priority list, particularly when you're starting out. Also, you may not get your ideal job first up. It is more important to find an employer and a job that gives you a pathway you want to take. Approach employers who look promising. There's a fine line between being persistent and being annoying, so always be very conscious and respectful of people's time. If you say you want to work for an organisation, have a clear set of reasons why; saying, 'because you look like a cool company' isn't a very strong reason. Instead think about their values as a business, the market they operate in, their reputation, how they fit in with your own vision of the work you want to do.

Bond University scholarships for 2020 are open online

Bond's scholarship program offers many full-fee and part-fee scholarships as well as cash bursaries. Most scholarships can be used for any single or combined program (except for the Medical Program). Scholarship applications for Year 12s must be lodged online using the Bond University application form.

Commonwealth Supported Places and HELP Loans

Commonwealth Supported Place (CSP) is a place at a university or higher education provider where the government pays part of your fees. This part is a subsidy, not a loan, and you don't have to pay it back.

This subsidy does not cover the entire cost of your study. Students must pay the balance of the tutiion fee, called the 'student contribution amount'. For more information about Commonwealth Supported Places and your eligibility visit the <u>Study Assist website</u>.

Those students who have a CSP can get a HECS-HELP loan to pay for their studies. A HECS-HELP loan does not cover costs like accommodation, laptops or text books, only tuition fees. To find out more information about HECS-HELP loans visit the <u>Study Assist website</u>.



The program is free and you can apply for a number of Australian Government scholarships to help you with the costs of study and relocation expenses if you need to move. Binders, Finishers and Screen Printers

Print finishers and screen printers bind books and other publications, finish printed products by hand and machine, prepare stencils and set up and operate power-driven and hand-operated screen print equipment. The qualification is Certificate III including at lease two years of on-the-job training, a Certificate IV, or at least three years of relevant experience, is usually needed. Open Days, Expos & Career Markets

How to make the best use of a career expo

The purpose of a career expo is to give you an opportunity to explore your future options in employment, training and/or higher education. While there are many resources available that provide this information, a career expo offers a unique opportunity as it has a broad range of information in the same place at the same time. Also, you can gather brochures to take home as well as get accurate, up-to-date information from representatives who can answer your questions, usually on the spot. However, to get the most out of a career expo, you need to do some preparation. First, go onto the expo website (most expos have a website) to find out about:

- The exhibitors industries, organisations, universities, colleges, TAFE, employers, etc. who will have a stand at the expo
- Activities some expos have activities such as 'Try-a-Trade'
- Seminars or workshops
- Competitions some expos use these as a drawcard for people to attend.

Make a list of the exhibitors, activities and seminars/workshops you want to visit. List the information you are looking for and/or the questions you want answered.

Most expos have a map of exhibitors (i.e. where their stands are located on the expo site). Use this to get around the expo to get the information you want. You could also look at who else is there. After the expo, it is a good idea to review your information and reflect on how this information might influence your future decision making. You could talk this over with your school Guidance Counsellor/Officer.

New York Film Academy (NYFA)

Study to be an enrolled nurse at the Mater

Mater Education offers a Diploma of Nursing. The course is delivered on a full-time or part-time basis. VET Student Loans are available for eligible students. Year 12 students apply directly to Mater Education, not through QTAC. The full-time course now has quarterly intakes each year, in January, April, July and October.

There is one intake per year for the part-time course commencing in January. See the <u>Mater Education</u> <u>website</u> for more information. Students who successfully complete the Diploma of Nursing may gain up to one year's credit towards a three-year Bachelor of Nursing. Indigenous and refugee background applicants may be eligible for a scholarship.

2020 Prerequisites

You can find the individual university and private provider prerequisites, assumed knowledge and recommended study for entry in 2020 on the QTAC site (scroll down page).

Before you choose your senior subjects, it is essential that current Year 10 students identify any prerequisites, assumed knowledge and recommended study for the courses that they are interested in at the end of Year 12. Not all universities and institutions have the same prerequisites, assumed knowledge or recommended study requirements, so it is essential that you check all universities and institutions. Click here (and scroll to the bottom of the page) for a list of the universities and institutions and their prerequisites, assumed knowledge and recommended studies for 2020.

English eligibility for ATAR in 2020

QTAC, who will be calculating individual ATARs, has outlined <u>eligibility requirements</u> students must meet to be awarded an ATAR. Student must have:

- satisfactorily completed an English subject
- completed five general subjects, or four general subjects plus one applied subject or VET course at AQF certificate III or above
- accumulated their subject results within a five-year period.

Important to note:

• Not all English subjects will meet the English prerequisite requirements for universities and courses. You must check each university's prerequisites.

- While students must satisfactorily complete an English subject to be eligible for an ATAR, the result
 in English will only be included in the ATAR calculation if it is one of the student's best five subjects.
- All five English subjects will count toward ATAR.

Key dates for 2019/2020

Year 12 students should put the following important dates in their diaries:

- 1 August 2019 QTAC Applications open
- 30 September 2019 Final date to apply for some courses
- 15 November 2019 First Offer round for Year 12 students

<u>Tertiary entry questions from current Year 12 students</u>

Q. - How do I apply to university for next year?

A. - You apply through <u>QTAC</u> for most Queensland tertiary courses. Applications to tertiary institutions in other states are through <u>tertiary admissions centres</u> like QTAC. You apply directly to all other institutions.

Q. - What is QTAC?

A. - The <u>Queensland Tertiary Admissions Centre</u> (QTAC) is a public, not-for-profit company that manages the application and offer processes for universities, TAFE Queensland and some private colleges in Queensland (three interstate institutions are also included). QTAC does not make the rules about entry to courses. The institutions make the rules and QTAC administers these rules.

Q. - How many courses can I apply for through QTAC?

A. - You can apply for up to six courses from any of the institutions that use QTAC. You receive only one offer (if you meet the prerequisites and have a competitive OP or Rank) at any given offer round. Find out more on the <u>Preferences page</u> of the QTAC website.

Q. - How are applicants selected for courses through QTAC?

A. - There are usually more applicants than available places for many of the courses. Selection is based on meeting minimum entry requirements (prerequisite subjects, folio, audition, etc.) and on merit (OP or Rank). Once minimum entry requirements are met, applicants compete on the basis of merit for competitive courses.

Q.-What is the difference between undergraduate and postgraduate courses?

A. - The term 'undergraduate' is normally applied to diploma, advanced diploma, associate degree and bachelor degree courses. 'Postgraduate' usually applies to courses you can study after completing a bachelor degree, e.g. graduate certificate, graduate diploma, masters and doctorate.

Which is the best university?

All Australian universities offer accredited courses that can lead to employment. Consequently, the better question is 'Which is the best university for me?' Consider the following when researching universities.

- Is the course offered at this university a pathway to the job I eventually want?
- Where is this university located? Can I realistically travel there? What are the transport options?
- Will the university help me gain work experience in my career area of interest while I do the course?
- How hard is it to get into this course at this university?
- Are the courses at this university full-fee or are they subsidised by the Commonwealth Government and eligible for HECS-HELP?
- If the courses are full-fee, is the institution accredited for FEE-HELP?
- Where do students of this course at this university go after they graduate?
- What support services are available at this university?
- What co-curricular activities (sport, clubs, etc.) are available at this university?
- What is the 'atmosphere' or working and social environment of the university like?
- Is it important to me to go to the same university as my friends?

These websites can help you with your research.

- QILT (Quality Indicators for Learning and Teaching) can help you compare study experience and employment outcomes data from Australian higher education institutions to select the institution with all the qualities you want.
- Rate Your Uni gives you student ratings for Australian universities.
- <u>The Good Universities Guide</u> has a course and institution search function and information on careers and scholarships. It also has a rating section for all Australian universities.
- <u>Study Assist</u> provides information on Australian Government financial assistance for further study.

<u>Literacy and Numeracy requirements for Queensland Certificate of Education (QCE) in 2020</u>

To be issued a QCE, students need to accrue the set amount of learning, at the set standard, in a set pattern, while meeting literacy and numeracy requirements. These requirements are aimed at ensuring students complete their senior schooling with the knowledge and skills they need for success in life beyond school. The QCE is issued to eligible students when they meet all requirements, usually at the end of Year 12.

The literacy and numeracy requirements can be met through a range of options. It is important when planning your senior subjects (and throughout your senior studies) that you know and understand the QCE literacy and numeracy requirements and that you choose correctly.

One way for a senior student in Queensland to meet the literacy standards is to study QCAA General or Applied English subjects for Unit 1, Unit 2, or a Unit 3 and 4 pair. These subjects include English, English & Literature Extension, English as an Additional Language, Literature and/or Essential English.

One way for a senior student in Queensland to meet the numeracy standards is to study QCAA General or Applied Mathematics subjects for Unit 1, Unit 2, or a Unit 3 and 4 pair. These subjects include General Mathematics, Mathematical Methods, Specialist Mathematics and/or Essential Mathematics. The set standard for both literacy and numeracy is satisfactory completion in Unit 1 or Unit 2 or a grade of C or better in a Unit 3 and 4 pair

Staying motivated

Take a break - Sometimes, all you need to motivate yourself again is to take a break. Go for a walk, catch up with friends, treat yourself to a movie or a meal. It's amazing how walking away from the immediate issues can help you see them with fresh eyes when you get back to them.

Reward yourself - Go on, have a treat! You may think you're not doing so well, so think about what you have already achieved, and reward yourself for that.

Remember the dream - If you're losing motivation, you're probably caught up with the day-to-day detail. Just remind yourself why you're doing this - to live a comfortable, successful, independent life. Now picture what that will be like. Feeling better?

Ask for help - If you're not clear on an assignment, ask your teacher or a fellow student. Just discussing the issues may make it clearer and kick start your energy.

Read a biography - Many of the famous, successful people we admire faced difficulties and failure in their lives. A biography will put your current challenges in context and allow you to see you're not alone.
